President's

Report

Dr. Wayne Pulver

It has been my pleasure to have served as president of the Canadian Academy of Endodontics during the last year. In addition to the various responsibilities of this position, I also had a special opportunity to co-chair the First Trans-Pacific Endodontic Conference in Maui this past April.

The meeting in Maui with our Australian colleagues — needless to say was a huge success. Over 100 endodontists with a total attendance of 160 certainly well exceeded our early estimates.

Many thanks to my Australian co-chairman, Paul Abbott and his committee for all their hard work. Our committee of Barry Chapnick, Wayne Acheson and John Fraser should be thanked for a job well done.

The scientific programme was first class. Many thanks to our CAE speakers — Cal Torneck, John Fraser, Paul Teplitzky and Shimon Friedman for such excellent presentations.

The meeting was planned to combine both scientific and a social aspect so that both groups could become better acquainted and I feel that this worked out very well.

Plans are already underway for the second Trans-Pacific Endodontic Conference in 2-3 years time.

Your CAE executive last met in January at Lake Louise. This venue allowed for added meeting time as well as time to relax and dialogue with one another.

We received a report on the 1993 annual convention which was held in Deerhurst. The meeting was a huge success and realized a profit of \$6,165.00.

Our 1994 convention will be held in Kananaskis, Alberta, Aug. 25-28, 1994. Programme Chairman, John Fraser, local arrangements chairman Kim Fuhrman, as well as social chairman, Joe Schwann and sports chairman, Jerry McAndrews and their committees have been hard at work planning for this terrific upcoming meeting. Please plan on attending! Also think about spending a few extra days visiting our beautiful Rockies — to golf, hike, or explore, you will definitely enjoy your experience.

I attended AAE president Dr. Eric Hovland's speech to the members of the AAE in Hawaii. In his speech, he stated that there are now fewer departments of endodontics in U.S. schools and fewer staff. He felt that scientific research is paramount to maintain the integrity of endodontics.

There was talk of expanding the scope of endodontics including newer areas of surgery, implants, pain and traumatic injuries. Other areas which we as endodontists must participate in are continuing education, as well as professional and public relations. In doing so, we will

let other health care providers know what we know.

Recertification of endodontists by the ADA will come up in a swift six years. There is much work to be done to be prepared to deal with this process.

Other specialty groups have considered changing their name to redefine their scope of practise. Although presently this isn't being considered, it hasn't been ruled out for the future.

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate Dr. Steve Brayton, our executive secretary on his appointment as representative to the CDA Committee on Dental Accreditation.

Under the leadership of Ray Greenfeld, the CAE Standards of Practice committee has been very busy. The committee meets again prior to our annual CAE meeting. Our thanks for all the hard work of this important committee.

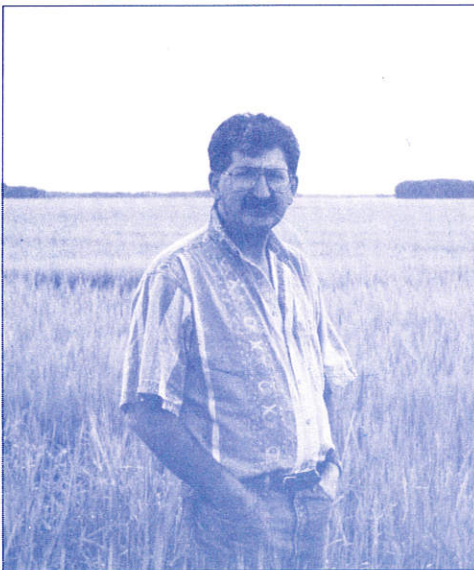

OFFICERS' REPORTS:

(a) PRESIDENT'S REPORT (Written report submitted)

1. The First Trans-Pacific Endodontic Meeting plans were progressing well. Wayne Acheson is to make up a Canadian travelog presentation for the Australians. Forty-three (43) had registered to date.

2. The American Association of Endodontists

a) Their new phone number is 1-800-U.S.A.-E.N.D.O.

b) It was decided by Executive that when the President of the A.A.E. attends our Annual Meeting, he will pay his own registration fee.

c) It will be the responsibility of our President to each year extend an invitation to the President of the A.A.E. to attend our Annual Meeting.

d) Dick Burns, incoming President of the A.A.E. will be attending our next Annual Meeting at the Inn at Kananaskis.

3. Wayne Pulver has had ongoing communication with the Post-Graduate Endodontic Program at the University of Toronto. It was decided on a MOTION by Steve Brayton, seconded by Wayne Acheson that the registration for the Annual Meeting of the C.A.E. would be waived for any students attending from the University of Toronto Post-Graduate Endodontic Program. MOTION CARRIED.

4. The President in the future will remind each year's Annual meeting Program Chairman to invite recent graduates of all endodontic programs to present papers of their research at the Annual Meeting.

5. The site of the 1995 I.F.E.A. meeting has been changed from Japan to Rome, Italy. Wayne Pulver and Barry Chapnick are to extend an invitation at the next I.F.E.A. meeting in April in Hawaii that the C.A.E. would some day like to host an I.F.E.A. World Congress in Canada, probably in Vancouver.

6. We received an invitation to have our 1996 Annual Meeting in Toronto on October 4-6, along with the other Specialty groups as part of the First Congress of Dental Specialists of Canada. Wayne Pulver is to follow up on this invitation, and if it looks like a go, we will plan for it.

The First Trans-Pacific Endodontic Conference

jointly sponsored by The Australian Society of Endodontology and the Canadian Academy of Endodontics

When you read the above, your first thoughts might be — “wow, that’s pretty impressive” and your second thought may be “it’s probably only a letterhead to satisfy the taxman!” In all actuality you would be correct on both counts, however in reality there was only one factor which was significant.



On Sunday April 24, 1994 a thought, a conversation, a dream between two people from two countries was finally realized. After years of “what if’s” and “wouldn’t it be great to ...” the dream of Stephen Cohen (Australia) and Marshall Peikoff (Canada) was finally realized. After months and years of effort Presidents Paul Abbott (Australia) and Wayne Pulver (Canada) officially opened the First Trans-Pacific Endodontic Conference in Maui, Hawaii.

As soon as you stepped off the plane, into the warm humid tropical breeze, with the sun “falling” into the depths of the ocean at sunset — you knew this was going to be a special week. All the ideas, the thoughts, the arrangements, the decisions had been made and all that was left was for everyone to enjoy the fruits of the Australian and Canadian Committee’s labors. When all was said and done it was evident this was a labor of love on both sides, and the only regret was the obvious absence of both original promoters of this meeting — Stephen Cohen (health problems) and Marshall Peikoff (prior commitments). Both were missed by everyone, however you did note the word “First” in the meeting name, so there is no doubt they will get another chance!

The excitement really began Sunday afternoon, as our own Barry Chapnick very capably handled the registration desk with more than enough help from the Aussies and Canucks! — inside everyone’s envelope was a lapel pin — an appropriately arranged red Canadian maple leaf and Australian boomerang — the logo of our meeting! Impressive! A collector’s item!

But it was here at the registration table, as people from both countries began to put names and faces together, you could sense the feeling of togetherness as everyone’s spirits began to take over. From here the flags of the two nations flew proudly on the beach in front of the Welcome Reception and the setting sun. Gradually the burning torches in the sand took over from the setting sun to distinguish the groups of Canadians, Australians and Canadians-Australians gathered together on this the First Trans-Pacific Endodontic Conference.

The next morning, Presidents Abbott and Pulver officially opened the scientific session. Paul Abbott entertained everyone with his laser-speed trip through the cities and highlights of Australia with a smattering of endodontic and dental information (Australian-style) thrown in on the side.

The scientific presentations and audio-visual aids were absolutely outstanding from each and every clinician involved — many commented on the quality of the presentations at this conference — it was something each clinician should be very proud of and we are certain they

worked very hard to achieve this level. Congratulations to all!

On the first morning Dr. John Fraser and Dr. Cal Torneck presented on behalf of Canada while Dr. Alex Moule and Dr. Barry Feiglin carried the colors of Australia. Moderators Mark Wotzke (Australia) and Wayne Acheson (Canada) kept the show running on time and without a hitch.

On the second morning Wayne Acheson introduced our own Canadian version of “Team Endo” from the east to west coast. A short “Canadiana” film followed which definitely left the Australians with the impression that we do have a beautiful country of four seasons even though it does snow sometimes!

Dr. Geoff Heithersay and Dr. Paul Fitz-Walter continued with the Australian scientific session while Dr. Shimon Friedman and Dr. Paul Teplitsky highlighted a Canadian perspective of endodontics. (Editor’s note: Paul Teplitsky demonstrated very capably that even though Canadians are quietly proud, we can still have a great sense of humor and can easily laugh at
